


Parish Mission Statement




"What then is a parish? It is the smallest section of the one universal flock which has been entrusted to Peter by the Lord.

Pastor's Note



MAKING A GOOD LENT

The Roman Martyrology heralds Ash Wednesday with these

words: *“The day of ashes and the beginning of the most holy fast of Lent.”*

This past Wednesday we began our Lenten journey towards Easter with the solemn service of Ash Wednesday. We received the imposition of blessed ashes on our foreheads as an acknowledgement of our mortality and as a sign of penance: *“Memento, homo, quia pulvis es et in pulverem reverteris—Remember, O man, dust thou art, and unto dust thou shalt return.”*

During these next six weeks we join in communion with the whole Church on earth in a more concentrated, heartfelt exercise of the works of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. We freely withdraw from many of the lawful pleasures of daily life for the sake of growing richer in the things that pertain to God.

The Mass readings for Ash Wednesday give us a good perspective on the *both-and* of Lenten discipline: Lent is to be lived in *both* its communal dimension *and* its private/personal dimension. The Lesson from the Prophet Joel, Chapter 2, emphasizes the communal dimension. The whole assembly of the people is summoned forth to participate in the public fast. *“Blow your trumpet in Sion: sanctify a fast, call a solemn assembly, gather together the people, sanctify the church, assemble the elders, gather together the little ones and them that suck at the breasts: let the bridegroom go forth from his bed and the bride out of her bride chamber. Between the porch and the altar the priests the Lord’s ministers shall weep and shall say; Spare, O Lord, spare Thy people: and give not*

Thy inheritance to reproach.” (Joel 2:12-17a)

The Gospel Lesson from Matthew Chapter 6 emphasizes the private/personal dimension: *“Take heed that you do not your justice before men, to be seen by them: otherwise you shall not have reward of your Father who is in heaven...And when thou dost alms, let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doth. That thy alms may be in secret: and thy Father who seeth in secret will repay thee...But when thou shalt pray enter into thy chamber and, having shut the door, pray to thy Father in secret: and thy Father who seeth in secret will repay thee.”*

Without an interior disposition of heart towards God, external observances will avail us nothing. Each person must do his part to be converted to God, to know himself more truly as God knows him, and that must happen necessarily in the space where it’s just “God-and-me”.

In regard to the communal dimension of Lent, we have the traditional practice of attending daily Mass during the days of Lent. The Mass formularies we have took shape for the most part during the 4th-6th centuries. During this period it was the custom in the city of Rome to celebrate daily Mass each year with the whole people during the 40 day preparation for Easter. This was done with great ceremony. The faithful would gather in one particular church with the Pope and the clergy and then process through the streets to another church where the Holy Eucharist would be celebrated. The readings and prayers of the Mass were highly instructional for those people who were preparing to be baptized on Easter Eve, particularly the daily Masses on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. For the assembly of the faithful, hearing again these yearly instructions served as re-enforcement for their own Christian profession. Daily Mass attendance throughout Lent and carrying over into the Masses each day of Easter Week is an excellent way for us to live the communal dimension of the Lenten/Easter pilgrimage.

SCRIPTURE STUDY

THE COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN
MISSAL: FEBRUARY 18th, 2018
ST. BERNADETTE

Today, February 18, marks the octave day of our Parish's feast of title. It is usually the day in which the Church offers an optional commemoration of the visionary of Lourdes, St. Bernadette Soubirous (this year, however, since her liturgical commemoration falls on the First Sunday of Lent, the latter necessarily prevails). The Collect for her feast calls her by her "*name in religion*" (i.e., her monastic name), which was Sister Mary Bernard. Below is the translation of this Collect from the MR '62 in the Angelus Press edition of the *Roman Catholic Daily Missal*:

"O God, protector and friend of the humble, Who filled Thy servant, Mary Bernard, with joy by the apparition and the conversation of the Immaculate Virgin Mary: grant, we pray, that by the simple way of faith we may be counted worthy to see Thee face to face in heaven. Through our Lord, etc. Amen."

This prayer acclaims God more literally as "*Protector and Lover of the humble*," which brings to mind Jesus' prayer in Mt. 11:25-30. In this prayer, He reveals His great love for the humble who have heard and accepted divine revelation: "*At that time Jesus declared, I thank You, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that You have hidden these things from the wise and understanding and revealed them to infants; yes, Father, for such was Your gracious will. All things have been delivered to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and any one to whom the Son chooses to reveal Him. Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you, and learn from Me; for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy, and My burden is light."*

When Jesus utters this prayer, He has in mind not only His Mother and His disciples, but *all* who, down through the ages, humbly receive His Gospel and strive to live the life of grace. Jesus' words apply fittingly to St. Bernadette, who did not even understand what Our Lady's self-disclosure ("I am the Immaculate Conception") meant, although she learned soon after.



Our Collect recalls the joy of the apparitions at Lourdes. We have just mentioned the joy of Mary's self-disclosure as "*the Immaculate Conception*," but we think also of her words to Bernadette of the happiness of heaven. The Collect's petition recalls this latter item, for we ask God that we might see him "*face to face in heaven*."

Entering into the happiness of heaven depends ultimately upon God's grace, but it also involves our cooperation. Church teaching on justification and final perseverance is clear on these points. The Collect's motive clause, "*the simple way of faith*," is one way of describing the substance of the Christian life as growth in the theological virtues of Faith, Hope and Charity. Thus, the simple way of faith entails three steps: (1) assenting to and receiving the content of divine revelation (Faith), (2) entrusting ourselves to Christ and His grace for daily life and for eternal life (Hope) and (3) living the commands of love for God and neighbor (Charity).

Living the simple way of faith, then, is our on-going cooperation with the graces of Baptism. This is what will lead us to see Christ face to face in heaven. St. Bernadette was given a foretaste of this when she beheld Our Lady, for Mary indeed reflects the glory of God's face in heaven. May St. Bernadette's example and prayers spur us on to be more faithful to the Gospel.



LATIN MASS PROPERS: THE FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT

INTROIT: Psalm 90. 15-16, 1 He shall cry to me, and I will hear him: I will deliver him, and I will glorify him: I will fill him with length of days. *Psalm.* He that dwelleth in the aid of the Most High: shall abide under the protection of the God of Heaven. *V.* Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen. — He shall cry to me ...

COLLECT: O God, Who dost purify Thy Church by the yearly observance of Lent: grant to Thy household, that what we strive to obtain from Thee by abstinence, we may achieve by good works. Through our Lord Jesus Christ ...

EPISTLE: From the Second Epistle of Blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians (II Cor. 6. 1-10)

Brethren: We exhort you that you receive not the grace of God in vain. For He saith: In an accepted time have I heard thee, and in the day of salvation have I helped thee. Behold, now is the acceptable time, behold now is the day of salvation. Giving no offense to any man, that our ministry be not blamed: but in all things let us exhibit ourselves as the ministers of God, in much patience, in tribulation, in necessities, in distresses, in stripes, in prisons, in seditions, in labors, in watchings, in fastings, in chastity, in knowledge, in long-suffering, in sweetness, in the Holy Ghost, in charity unfeigned, in the word of truth, in the power of God: by the armor of justice on the right hand and on the left: by honor and dishonor, by evil report and good report: as deceivers and yet true, as known and yet unknown: as dying, and behold we live: as chastised and not killed: as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing: as needy, yet enriching many: as having nothing and possessing all things.

GRADUAL: Psalm 90. 11-12 God has given His Angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways. In their hands they shall bear thee up, lest thou dash thy foot against a stone. **TRACT** Psalm 90. 1-7, 11-16 He that dwelleth in the aid of the Most High, shall abide under the protection of the God of heaven. He shall say to the Lord: Thou art my protector and my refuge: my God, in Him will I trust. For He hath delivered me from the snare of the hunters, and from the sharp word. He will overshadow thee with His shoulders, and under His wings thou shalt trust. His truth shall compass thee with a shield: thou shalt not be afraid of the terror of the night. Of the arrow that flieth in the day, of the business that walketh about in the dark, of invasion or of the noonday devil. A thousand shall fall at thy side, and ten thousand at thy right hand: but it shall not come nigh to thee. For He hath given His Angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways. In their hands they shall bear thee up, lest thou dash thy foot against a stone. Thou shalt walk upon the asp and the basilisk, and thou shalt trample under foot the lion and the dragon. Because he hoped in Me I will deliver him: I will protect him, because he hath known My Name. He shall cry to Me, and I will hear him: I am with him in tribulation. I will deliver him, and I will glorify him: I will fill him with length of days, and I will show him My salvation.

GOSPEL: Continuation of the holy Gospel according to St. Matthew 4. 1-11 At that time Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert, to be tempted by the Devil. And when He had fasted forty days and forty nights, afterwards He was hungry. And the tempter coming said to Him: If Thou be the Son of God, command that these stones be made bread. Who answered and said: It is written: Not in bread alone doth man live, but in every word that proceedeth from the mouth of God. Then the Devil took Him up into the holy city and set Him upon the pinnacle of the temple, and said to Him: If Thou be the son of God, cast Thyself down. For it is written: That He hath given His Angels charge over Thee, and in their hands shall they bear Thee up, lest perhaps Thou dash Thy foot against a stone. Jesus said to him: It is written again, Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God. Again the Devil took Him up into a very high mountain and showed Him all the kingdoms of the world and the glory of them, and said to Him: All these will I give Thee, if falling down Thou wilt adore me. Then Jesus saith to him: Begone, Satan! for it is written: The Lord Thy God shalt thou adore, and Him only shalt thou serve. Then the Devil left Him.

OFFERTORY: Psalm 90. 4-5 The Lord will overshadow thee with His shoulders, and under His wings thou shalt trust: His truth shall compass thee with a shield.

SECRET: We solemnly offer to Thee, O Lord, the Sacrifice of the beginning of Lent, beseeching Thee: that while we curtail our eating of meat, we may abstain also from harmful pleasures. Through our Lord ...

PREFACE FOR LENT: It is truly meet and just, right and for our salvation, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks to Thee, holy Lord, Father almighty, eternal God: Who by this bodily fast dost curb our vices, lift our minds, strength and rewards bestow; through Christ our Lord. Through Whom Angels praise Thy Majesty, Dominations worship, Powers stand in awe. The Heavens and the hosts of heaven with blessed Seraphim unite, exult, and celebrate. And we entreat that Thou wouldst bid our voices too be heard with theirs, singing with lowly praise: — *Sanctus*.

COMMUNION: Psalm 90. 4-5 The Lord will overshadow thee with His shoulders, and under His wings thou shalt trust: His truth shall compass thee with a shield.

POSTCOMMUNION: May the holy reception of Thy Sacrament, O Lord, so restore us that we may be purified from our former ways and join the company of the redeemed. Through ...


LENTEN REGULATIONS

1. **Abstinence from Flesh Meat:** obliges beginning on a person's 14th birthday and applies to Ash Wednesday and all Fridays during Lent.
2. **Practice of Penance:** all Catholics should perform some act of penance on the weekdays of Lent (for example, our personal Lenten sacrifices), and Fridays throughout the year (for example, not eating meat on Friday).
3. **Days of Fast:** Ash Wednesday & Good Friday. On these 2 days of the year all Catholics between the ages of 18-59 are bound to fast according to the guideline of 1 full-meal permitted and 2 smaller meals allowed to maintain strength.



Any person is free to observe the more stringent laws of abstinence, penance and fast in place before 1965 for himself, provided he understands that he cannot impose that same strictness on others.






